Scam Alert - BHSU

Someone claiming to be from a large multi-national company recently contacted a SDSM&T student encouraging the student to apply for a job. The student then posted his resume to Ziprecruiter.com, which is a reputable site. The multi-national company is real and reputable.

Here is an account of what happened, can you spot the warning signs?

- Student was contacted about a by a "recruiter" (scammer) who pulled our student's resume from the recruiting web site. The ONLY interview option was an online chat interview. The student asked if there would be a video chat/phone call. It was explained that "this is the way the world is advancing, so we want to use this method." (first warning sign)
- 2. The scammer used a broad variety of descriptive language, which was copied and pasted from the company's website. The scammer asked for the person's sex (gender), which a US company would not ask in an interview. (second warning sign)
- 3. The scammer mentioned the following job requirements:
 - Must be fluent in communication and English
 - Must be at least 30wpm average
 - Must be 18+
 - Must have a Bank Account (third warning sign)
- 4. The scammer said that the company will be setting up office branches "near your location" and that the student would work from home until the office is set up. (4th warning sign—no specific location)
- 5. The scammer talked about flexible working hours and very high pay for both training (\$17:00 per hour) and hourly work after training (\$25:75 per hour). (5th and 6th warning signs VERY high pay for very low job requirements and incorrect format of currency. It should be \$17.00 and \$25.75)
- 6. The scammer asked "what type of system the student uses—Mac or PC?". The student answered PC, so the scammer stated they require Mac systems thus student will have to get Mac equipment. (7th warning sign required to purchase something before proceeding)
- 7. The scammer then attempted to obtain the student's SSN and bank account: "The company will provide you a free Apple Mac Book Pro laptop with a fast internet connection and your W4 form will be coming along with the working materials you need to start working with... the company will be providing you with the funds you will be using to purchase the necessary equipment and software programs." (8th and warning signs a W4 will require your Social Security number, which you should NEVER give to someone who contacts you)
- 8. The scam then goes for your bank information: "Once you received the check you are needed to have it deposited to your bank account, Then the funds will be will be credited and available in your account for cash out the next day. (9th and 10thwarning signs Funds from a check are rarely available that quickly AND strangers should not be given your bank account number)

Please DO NOT get caught up in this type of scam, and it can happen with ANY company and ANY resume posting site at ANY time. We have reported this to the FBI and we contacted the company in question, which confirmed it is a scam.

Fortunately, this student figured out it was a scam and did not lose his money. He reported the incident to School of Mines authorities and the FBI is now involved. We ask you to always be vigilant and to report any suspicious activities to law enforcement or our Department of Public Safety.

Distinguished Faculty Nominations Requested

The Faculty Senate seeks nominations for the annual Distinguished Faculty Award. The purpose of the award is to encourage and reward outstanding professional dedication by faculty members of Black Hills State University. Nominees should show continued excellence in teaching; active research, scholarship, and other creative endeavors; their ongoing contributions to the community and society; and their continued exceptional service to students. One award shall be given each school year when there is a qualified nominee. Previous winners of the award are not eligible.

Eligibility

The nominee shall be a faculty member whose primary assignment is teaching, and shall have taught a minimum of 36 hours during the past three years. Department chairs are eligible for the award if the above requirement is met in the school year when nominated.

Nominations will be made to Jami Stone, the Faculty Senate Vice-President by February 3, 2017. The nomination letter/email should outline the reasons why the nominated person is deserving of the award. The letter/email should include a framework indicating the intent to acquire the required letters of support.

A colleague from the department, school, college, or other college can nominate a person for the Distinguished Faculty Award. Henceforth this person will be referred to as the nominator.

The nomination process will be conducted in a manner so that the award is a complete surprise to all nominees and the eventual Distinguished Faculty Award person recommended.

The nominator is responsible for acquiring three letters of support for the Distinguished Faculty Award nominee. The letters should not exceed two typewritten pages (12-font).

One letter of support should primarily focus on the nominee's continued excellence in teaching.

The second letter of support should address the nominee's continued exceptional service to students, the university, and society in general.

The third letter of support should primarily focus on the nominee's active contributions to research, scholarship, and other creative endeavors in his or her discipline.

The letters may address the other two areas.

One of the three letters could originate from a different college but it is not a requirement.

The nominator is responsible for acquiring the nominee's vita from the department chair. In the case where a department chair may be nominated, the vita can be accessed from the school dean.

The three letters of support and vita are due to the faculty senate vice president by Friday, February 17, 2017.

Recommendation Process

Previous Distinguished Award winner BHSU faculty members will comprise the recommendation committee. The faculty senate vice president will serve as non-voting chair.

The Distinguished Faculty Committee will meet as a complete group, review the materials and select an individual to recommend to the Faculty Senate. The committee meeting will occur the third week in February of the current school year.

A Faculty Senate meeting is scheduled for February 22, 2017 so that the Faculty Senate can confirm the Distinguished Faculty Committee recommendation. This meeting may take place over email.

At the conclusion of the Faculty Senate meeting on February 22, 2017, the faculty senate vice president will forward the committee's recommendation to the Provost for review and approval. The recommendation will be delivered to the Provost by March 3, 2017.

RECOGNITION:

- Acknowledgement of the distinguished faculty member at the May University commencement with a presentation of a plaque.
- The Distinguished Faculty Award recipient may be excused from speaking at commencement if the recipient does not wish to speak publicly.

- A \$500 monetary gift shall be awarded to the recipient for professional development. An additional \$500 will be awarded to the recipient to be used at his or her discretion. The recipient will submit invoices to the BHSU Foundation.

Geek Speak, "Mammas Don't Let Your Babies Grow Up to Be Oscar Wilde: The Dialectical Cowboy," hosted by Dr. Tim Steckline.

Please join us on Thursday, January 12, at 4:00 p.m. in Jonas 110 for this week's Geek Speak, "Mammas Don't Let Your Babies Grow Up to Be Oscar Wilde: The Dialectical Cowboy," hosted by Dr. Tim Steckline. These lectures are free and open to the public.

In 1882 Oscar Wilde made a tour of the American West bringing "aesthetic revival" to crowds in a string of Rocky Mountain mining camps, cow camps and train stops. He was not warmly greeted. The emergence of the cowboy myth around this same time reflects the reaction of American males to the sort of decadence Wilde exemplified. From Owen Wister and Teddy Roosevelt and Buffalo Bill onwards, cowboys represent a figure of ambivalence toward civilization and its costs. In the century to follow a dialectical progression of cowboy types evolves out of this conflicted response to decadence (or over-civilization), on the one hand, and to its countervailing corrective atavism (or regression from civilization) on the other. My tracing of this dialectic identifies five "cowboys" that popular culture has drawn upon for the depiction of saddle tramps, and draws illustrations from not only Wister and Wilde, but additionally John Wayne, Lonesome Dove, cowboy trail songs, Wild West Shows, Willie Nelson and Waylon Jennings, the Village People, Kid Rock, Ennis and Jack of Brokeback Mountain, Montgomery Clift, Tom McGuane, Ween, and a passel of others. Slap leather and come jaw for awhile, pilgrims, and when we get back to the ranch there's gonna be a cool diagram too.
