#### Fall 2017 Course Information

#### Attention faculty using D2L for Fall 2017 courses:

Spring courses have been loaded into D2L. Please let Anne know as soon as possible if you would like multiple sections of your *Fall* courses combined into one course in D2L. The term used by D2L is "mapping" them together. As an example, a request could include courses such as:

SPED 431 B601 & B603 being mapped as SPED 431 B601 B603

SPED 431/531 B601 & B603 being mapped as SPED 431 531 B601 B603

ENGL 101 B001 & B002 & B003 being mapped as ENGL 101 B001 B002 B003

Also, if you have cross-listed courses to be mapped together, please let us know.

The current schedule from RIS will allow mapping to begin on March 24 and we will have until 3:00pm April 4 to complete it. Once mapped, the courses will be available to you for editing early the next day. Therefore, the sooner they are mapped, the quicker you will have access to them.

All courses not previously released will be available for you to edit by the early morning on April 5. Mapping can still be done after the courses are released, but extra time and steps are involved because the courses must be removed from the Learning Environment, mapped, and then released again — which can take up to 24 hours before you again have access. If you do not want a course mapped, but would like access to it before April 5, just let us know by email.

We do not map courses unless requested by the instructor.

If you need course materials from a previous semester copied to a 2017FA course, please let Anne or me know. It generally only takes a few minutes to do this.

It is very helpful and more efficient for us if you specify your courses by Department, Course Number, and Section Number when contacting us for either mapping or copying. For example: "Copy SPED 431 B601 from Fall 2016 into my SPED 431 B603 Fall 2017."

#### Whaling and Phishing Scams

Be on the alert for whaling and phishing scams that may make it into your email mailbox. Whaling emails are emails that look like they come from a senior executive or a high-level administrator, often asking for money transfers, login information, account numbers, personally identifiable information, credit card numbers, etc. Since the emails appear to be coming from the executive, they are often using an email address that is outside of the university but using the executive's name. If you have the slightest hint that messages are not

legitimate, ask the sender in-person or by another means to accurately identify the legitimacy. When in doubt, throw it out.

Phishing messages are different from whaling messages as they do not appear to come from a senior official within the university or organization. Phishing messages are similar whaling messages in that they attempt to gather your usernames and passwords, personally identifiable information, credit card numbers, banking information, etc. Phishing messages also press urgency, including threats of mailbox deactivation, requirements for upgrades, and even threats of "legal" action. Again, when in doubt, throw it out.

You are also more than welcome to send us an email to let us know that a phishing message made it through. # Geek Speak: Advocating for the Protection of Native Women Through Theatrical, Spoken Word and Slam Poetry Performances

Today, in the United States, one out three Native women will be raped during her lifetime, 60% of Native women will be assaulted in their lifetimes. . . 67% of violent crimes committed against Native women are committed by non-Natives" (Sliver of a Full Moon). Twenty-three percent of violent crimes against Native women by Native men can be linked to intergenerational trauma resulting from the effects of oppression, including the boarding school system. Because of legal loopholes in federal law, like the Major Crimes Act (1885) and Oliphant v. Suquamish (1978), there were no legal protections for Native women who were victimized physically and/or sexually until the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) was renewed in 2013. VAWA offers some protections, but some violent crimes are still omitted. Perhaps worse yet, VAWA only offers protection for Native women living on reservation lands within the continental United States. Alaska Native women and Hawaiian women have been omitted from the protections afforded by VAWA. This Geek Speak seeks to explore the way in which Native women (and men) in the United States are using/used slam poetry, theatrical productions and spoken word videos to advocate for greater legal protections for Native women under VAWA. Specifically, this Geek Speak will address the production of Cherokee playwright Mary Kathryn Nagle's Sliver of a Full Moon, the spoken word video of Ryan Redcorn's poem "To the Indigenous Women," and the performance of Whisper Kish's slam poem "Violence Against Native Women is not Traditional", to open up a discussion about the

ways in which Indigenous performances represent Native agency and anti-violence activism in the struggle for the protection of Native women and girls throughout the United States.

All lectures are held in Jonas 110 at 4:00 p.m. on Thursdays and are free and open to the public.
