NCUR 2018: Call for Abstracts by University Research Council

NCUR 32 Abstract Guidelines: [Certain Important dates, instructions and links has been highlighted for your convenience]

Deadline for submission to University Research Council by submitting it via the following BHSU link http://www.bhsu.edu/Research/NCUR/Application.aspx is November 10th and the students/mentor will be notified by November 27th.

After the abstracts has been reviewed by URC and possibly a panel after which the students/mentor will be notified. After the notification, then submit the abstract via the link on NCUR 2018 homepage from November 27th- December 5, 2017

All approved abstracts must be submitted online through the link on the NCUR 2018 homepage. The link will be open October 3rd through December 5th . All primary submitters will need to create a new account. Note to students who have submitted to NCUR in previous years: A new NCUR account must be created each year. Information does not carry over from year to year.

Notification of acceptance of the abstract by NCUR will begin around January 23, 2018, and continue through middle of February, 2018.

Should your abstract be accepted, you may register for the conference using the same login information. Early registration opens on January 23, 2018 through February 22, 2018.

Abstracts should:

- 1. Clearly state the central research question and/or purpose of the project.
- 2. Provide brief, relevant scholarly or research context (no actual citations required) that demonstrate its attempt to make a unique contribution to the area of inquiry.
- 3. Provide a brief description of the research methodology.
- 4. State conclusions or expected results and the context in which they will be discussed.
- 5. Include text only (no images or graphics)
- 6. Be well-written and well-organized.

Other formatting guidelines:

- 1. References are allowed within abstracts, but not required.
- 2. The form will not process all formatting and special characters (e.g., scientific

symbols). Use plain text format for your abstract. There is space in the form to include a link to online documentation, formulas, images, music files, etc. in support of your submission. You may use this space to provide a link to a location to view your abstract in its original form.

3. Abstracts are usually 200-300 words long with no paragraph breaks. MAXIMUM LENGTH = 300 WORDS!

Have the following information available when submitting your abstract:

- 1. Name and e-mail address for each faculty mentor and co-author
- 2. Undergraduate Research Office Coordinator (UROC) name, e-mail address, and phone number. If you do not have an UROC then provide the information for whomever is the point of contact at your institution
- 3. Presentation type: oral, poster, visual arts, or performing arts
- 4. Field of study (See below for the complete list.)

Two abstracts per primary author are permitted. There is no limit on the number of abstracts submitted per co-author.

All abstracts will undergo a rigorous evaluation by a panel of faculty reviewers. Abstract reviewers will evaluate submissions based on the criteria listed above and will assess overall merit within the context of the specific academic discipline.

Note: The title and author(s) of your abstract will appear EXACTLY as they are entered in the abstract submission form. Please double check punctuation and spelling before submitting.

Geek Speak: "The Meaning of Everything"

Join us Thursday October 5 at 4 pm in Jonas 110 as Professor Andrey Reznikov presents: The Meaning of Everything: The Making of the Oxford English Dictionary
This year celebrates 160th anniversary of the beginning of what would become OED: a unique undertaking in the field of lexicography. The members of the Philological Society who first discussed the idea of a New English Dictionary in 1857 probably did not realize what they were getting themselves into. They believed the dictionary will be in 4 volumes and about 6,400 pages, and it will be ready in 10 years. They were wrong in all three estimates: the dictionary was ready in 70 years, it was in 10 volumes and had 15, 490 pages. About 2,000 people contributed 5 million quotations to the editorial board; one of the most prolific contributors was American physician, Civil War veteran, Dr. W.C.
