Geek Speak is BACK! Join us on Mondays at 4:00 p.m. in Jonas 110 starting September 23. These lectures are for the curious, the enthusiastic, and the inquisitive: come geek out with us.

November 18: The Man, The Myth, The Codes: Decoding myths of the Industrial Working-Class, Hosted by Dr. Katelyn Kelly

At the close of the 19th century, the United States was a nation in flux, where the surge of industrialism, the aftermath of reconstruction, and an expanding railway network fostered unprecedented connections across the country. This era demanded a flexible working class, leading to the rise of labor unions, protests, and strikes, all while a quieter yet equally intriguing subculture emerged: hobos & tramps. These transient workers, who traveled by freight trains in search of opportunity, developed a secret language of symbols known as "hobo codes," serving as a covert communication system, sharing vital information about safe havens, dangers, and

work prospects. The hobo community encapsulated the complexities of the Gilded Age, reflecting the stark economic inequalities and the spirit of independence & resilience among those navigating a rapidly changing landscape. While their codes and monikers caused fear and fascination for those around them, what did the codes do for the hobo community? What can we learn from this 'secret society?' In this Geek Speak we will explore the Hobo subculture, codes and monikers and what they can tell us about one community that was a staple to the United States industrial expansion.

December 2: In The Shadow of Giants: An Assessment of State Building Near Authoritarian Major Powers, Hosted by John Van Benthuysen

Every year around a third of the word's nearly 200 states are fragile and at risk of failing. The consequences of this crisis can be measured by the record number of displaced people in the world, which is trending upwards and now regularly exceeds 100 million people. State building offers a potential remedy for this crisis, but progress remains elusive despite a vast scholarly literature on the topic and decades of efforts by would be state builders. General theories of state building cast at domestic and systemic levels of analysis are prominent in comparative politics and international relations, but such theories frequently lack efficacy. A different approach to the study of state building is warranted, one more attuned to the regional context of individual states. This study contributes to the state building research effort by adopting a regional level of analysis that highlights neglected place based conditionalities associated with the neighborhood's states reside in, like the presence of authoritarian major powers. Focusing on regions reveals the previously neglected prominence of emulation, hierarchy, and subversion in the state building process.
