COURSE HIGHLIGHTS

Political Science students at BHSU take a diverse range of courses through their studies. Some of theses unique classes are:

- INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS: Can war be just or abolished? Do trade and democracy provide pathways to peace? These are some of the questions explored in International Relations. Students also engage in a 10 week online simulation of International Relations that demonstrates key concepts and issues involving conflict, diplomacy, international law, human rights, and trade.
- CONSTITUTIONAL LAW: How much religion should be allowed in public schools? Is the death penalty cruel and unusual? Can the national government regulate semiautomatic rifles? Study the history and development of civil rights and liberties in a class designed for both those interested in law school and those just interested in big political questions.
- POLITICAL THEORY: What rights do we have and how are these rights in tension with one another? What is the relationship between the common good and self-interest? Does justice exist or is the meaning of justice merely dictated to us by the powerful? This course surveys the development of normative and political concepts in Western thought. Students will critically evaluate the ideas of political theorists like Plato, Machiavelli, Locke, the Federalists, Marx, Nietzsche, Dubois, and Friedan.
