#### FACULTY AND STAFF LEAD INITIATIVE TO PLACE MURAL IN DOWNTOWN SPEARFISH

Black Hills State University spearheaded the creation of the new public art mural on Jackson and 5th Streets in Spearfish. The vibrant mural, which was a true community project, was completed in September.

BHSU students and assistant professor of art, Desy Schoenewies, collaborated with K-12 schools and community organizations to create mural pieces for installation. ## GLOBAL UNDERGRADUATE EXCHANGE PROGRAM AT BHSU INCLUDES COMMUNITY SERVICE, INTERNSHIP AND ACADEMIC COMPONENTS

Black Hills State University continues its collaboration with a U.S. Department of Statesponsored program welcoming six new students from Pakistan and Tunisia to campus this year.

The six students on campus are recognized as highly motivated undergraduate student leaders. The goal of the U.S. Department of State program is to promote greater understanding between the people of the U.S. and the people of other countries, including future world leaders.

Eric Leise, director of International Relations at BHSU, says the Global Undergraduate Exchange Programs for Pakistan and Tunisia (UGRAD-Pakistan and Tunisia UGRAD) benefit all countries involved. By coming to the U.S., students are able to share their unique viewpoints and backgrounds bringing a global perspective to their host communities, and share this understanding of the U.S. with their communities when they return home. <u>Read more</u>

### STUDENT ATHLETE PARTICIPATES IN GROUNDBREAKING RESEARCH

Ashley Davis, a member of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa tribe, from Belcourt, N.D., plays the wing position for the BHSU basketball team and majors in exercise science. This summer, Davis had an incredible opportunity to conduct research measuring radioactivity at underground research facilities in the Black Hills and Italy.

The research was part of the Germanium Materials and Detectors Advancement Research Consortium (GEMADARC) undergraduate research experience. The GEMADARC project holds a global partnership of 11 institutions across five countries including Canada, China, Taiwan, Germany, and the U.S. Their mission is to advance knowledge, research and discovery in fundamental physics, provide opportunities for undergraduate STEM majors, and to improve global collaboration on Germanium-related technology. <u>Read more</u>
